
Discussion

- Many commented that a lot of work has been done to engage the public on these issues and the input offered is helpful. Many suggested the Council must continue to engage the public after December 1st.
- Many councilors commented on the time pressure imposed by the Dec. 1 deadline to produce a Climate Action Plan, and how the public senses that time pressure, and how it works against some of the principles of a just transition. The engagement after Dec 1 should be structured to address these fundamental principles.
- Councilors noted that many Vermonters haven't weighed in on the issues yet and may not understand how significant they are.
- Council members were asked to recognize the demands placed on ANR in the GWSA that could result in court enforced actions that could be detrimental.
- Councilors asked if they could see the raw data and also potentially filter data by geography or other attributes.


