Challenge(s) Experienced

Committee seems under resourced for the things we are supposed to be doing.

lack of clarity in my role as a SC member, or of the SC

learning curve of government meetings, understanding my role

Lack of shared understanding of our purpose as a group. It feels like we could and want to work on everything, but have so little capacity.

Lack of time, lack of resources, lack of cohesiveness and the ability to onboard individuals who do not do this for a living

Migrating just transitions principles and practices to local government.

communicating information to my network and expecting a response

Balancing the urgency of our work with the pace necessary to do our work well

process is slow and change takes longer than I am comfortable with

Being mindful of my privilege. At times I fail.

the work is slow and hard, not feeling a holistic shared work goal/direction, but finding traction only here or there

I'm proud of how much progress we've made, but I know there is so much further to go, and it's hard to live in that space, especially when a lot of our feedback from the public is that we haven't done enough.

Lack of expertise as a climate advocate and not always being familiar with what the sub committee is discussing.

Clarity around what we want to see happen vs what we want/can be responsible for

lack of clarity around how the JT SC fits into the work of the Council since we didn't submit recommendations but were more focused on process/outreach/engagement strategies

Any government work is so technical - and its hard for bureacrats, even well meaning, to speak in plain language

The challenge is No one listens from the first time And it is trying to keep repeating yourself

lack of shared understanding of JT work, within the JT, by ANR, by the Climate Council

Addressing and overcoming my ignorance as to my own privilege and biases. The systemic injustice within existing modes of engagement and therefore inability to listen, learn and change.

limited capacity to engage as fully as I would like to

In a state that deems itself to be progressive it can be difficult for those in positions of privilege to acknowledge reality.

Frame the transition as a better and necessary alternative to the status quo. There is still plenty of resistance!

I want us to be more unified in our purpose. Not necessarily take a particular stance on a climate policy or strategy (though certainly individuals do and should), so much as to continue to hold up JT principles and to support a process which embraces, uses and is accountable to those principles. And use our professional and lived experiences to shine a light on situations where things are going awry.
