- 8/24 Consideration of biomass management in forest management (Confirmed)
- 9/14 (Potential) Dr. Juliette Rooney-Varga is a Professor of Environmental Sciences at the University of Massachusetts, Director of the Climate Change Initiative, and Co-Director of the Rist Institute for Sustainability and Energy. Because Vermont's electricity sector is only marginally powered by natural gas (and oil to an even lesser extent), comparisons to those fuels are not particularly helpful in the electricity context. The more likely electricity sources to be displaced in Vermont by biomass are hydropower, nuclear, solar, and wind. Dr. Rooney would speak about the relative GHG outcomes of those sources compared to biomass.
- Dr. Jerome <u>Laganiere study</u> allows us to compare biomass LCA emissions to two of the fossil fuels that are most relevant to Vermont (natural gas and oil) for both electricity and thermal applications.
- Health implications of wood biomass and the Buonocore study
- Listening Session with residents from around McNeil Power Plant

8:45 AM CPG Permit Conditions and Role of VFWD in Review of Chip Harvests, John Austin, Lands and Habitat Program Manager, and Tim Appleton, Wildlife Biologist, Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department and Tyler Mousley, Forester, Ryegate

The Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department has been engaged in reviewing timber harvest notifications from Burlington Electric Department since 1981 and with Ryegate since 1992. The authority granted to the Department extends to deer winter habitat, wetlands, riparian habitat for streams, rivers, lakes and ponds, significant natural communities, and habitat for threatened and endangered species. The purpose of the conditions in their Certificate of Public Good (CPG) and the notification process is to ensure that timber harvest operations that sell wood to these two facilities do not impact these wildlife habitats. Distinctions were made between the criteria in Act 250 and the authority the Department has through this process. Staff generally spoke to it as a productive relationship where they could generally work to advance wildlife life management interests in these projects.

Questions arose about the percentage of wood these two facilities procured in VT verses neighboring states and Ryegate agree to provide that <u>data</u>.
