Fuel Assistance Rules

- Federal funds Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) block grant & limited state funding
- Providers must be Certified with the State to Receive Payments
- Automatic Renewal of Certification for up to 3 Years.
- Choose a Pricing Agreement for Each Fuel Type
- 30 Day Notice to Cancel/Non-renew/Terminate Certification
- Make Crisis Deliveries/Bill CAP Agencies
- Communicate via Email
- Accept funds electronically, Transfer benefits upon request
- Provide timely, accurate information for Federal Reporting

Margin Over Rack (MOR)

- Oil Price Information Service (OPIS) Provides Rack Pricing
- Average 4 Racks Plus \$0.50
- Post Daily on Website



Discount Off Retail (DOR)

Fixed Discount

- \$0.15 Per Gallon Off Daily Posted Retail Price *in Addition to* Any Regular Cash or Prompt Payment Discount
- Example
 - \$2.25/gallon retail
 - \$.15 DOR
 - \$.10 Cash
- Price: \$2.00/gallon



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Common Threads

- Customer Negotiated Contracts with Fixed or Cap Pricing Supersede MOR/DOR Agreements
- Pricing Agreement Applies to Crisis Funds Also (with Exception of Cash Discount After \$0.15 DOR)
- All Suppliers Are Subject to Audit of Records by AHS Audit Unit or designee.



Federal Reporting Requirements

 Section 2610 of the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Act (42 USC Sec. 8629) Requires States to Provide the Following Data to the Federal Government.

STUDIES

Section 2610.

(a) The Secretary, after consultation with the Secretary of Energy, shall provide for the collection of data, including--

(1) information concerning home energy consumption;

(2) the amount, cost and type of fuels used for households eligible for assistance under this title;

(3) the type of fuel used by various income groups;

(4) the number and income levels of households assisted by this title;

(5) the number of households which received such assistance and include one or more individuals who are 60 years or older or disabled or include young children; and

(6) any other information which the Secretary determines to be reasonably necessary to carry out the provisions of this title. Nothing in this subsection may be construed to require the Secretary to collect data which has been collected and made available to the Secretary by any other agency of the Federal Government.

Program Descriptions (Seasonal Fuel)

- Program Description
 - Helps low-income families pay a portion of their home heating bills
 - Assistance is provided to home owners or renters who pay for heat or have heat costs included in their rent
- Eligibility Criteria
 - Monthly gross income must be at or under 185% of the Federal Poverty Level (adjusted annually)
 - There are no resource limits
- Benefit Payments
 - Eligible households receive a single benefit payment, paid between September and April. Benefits payments are for primary heating sources, including wood, pellets, electricity, oil, propane, kerosene, coal, and natural gas
- Administered by the Department for Children and Families

Program Descriptions (Crisis Fuel)

- Program Description
 - Emergency fuel and metered utility service for households facing a home heating crisis
 - Crisis is defined as having a cord of wood or less, 25% or less in bulk fuel tank, or receipt of a disconnect notice
- Eligibility Criteria
 - Monthly gross income must be 200% of the Federal Poverty Level or less
 - There is a resource limit (between \$1,500-\$2,250)
 - Maximum of 1-2 assists per season depending on FPL
- Administered by Five Community Action Agencies
 - NECKA, CVOEO, CAPSTONE, BROC, and SEVCA



Program Descriptions (UDEU)

- GMP Energy Assistance Program (EAP)
 - Program Description
 - Assists low-income GMP customers with their household energy costs by providing a 25% discount on the monthly energy bill
 - Eligibility Criteria
 - Must be a residential customer of GMP
 - Must have gross income of 150% of Federal Poverty Level or less
- VGS Low Income Assistance Program (LIAP)
 - Program Description
 - Assists low-income VGS customers with their household energy bills by providing a 20% discount to their total monthly natural gas bill

Program Descriptions (UDEU Cont.)

- Eligibility
 - Must be a residential customer of VGS
 - Must have a gross monthly income of 185% of the Federal Poverty Level or less
- Eligibility is Administered by the Department for Children and Families
- Fuel Assistance Clients Can Also Be Concurrently Enrolled in Either, or Both, Utility Discount Programs

Program Descriptions (ANR Tank Replacement)

- The LIHEAP Block Grant provides \$75K Annually to the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to supplement the Aboveground Storage Tank (AST) Removal/Replacement Program
- Requirements
 - Proof of ownership
 - Verification of Income
- Program provides up to \$2,000 to remove and replace a redtagged AST
- DEC has recently proposed new rules for this program

Program Descriptions (Weatherization)

- A portion of federal LIHEAP funding is designated to the Office of Economic Opportunity for weatherization services.
- Community Action and Weatherization staff use the ACCESS database to verify information used to determine eligibility for services.
- Income eligibility for Weatherization services is different than other fuel programs
 - To be eligible for LIHEAP-funded weatherization activities, households must be under 60% of the State Median Income (SMI)

OnBase and ACCESS Systems

 Benefit Program Specialists (BPS's), located in 12 District Offices and the Benefit Service Center (BSC), are responsible for determining eligibility using the OnBase and the ACCESS Systems.



ACCESS

- The State's Mainframe Database is Called the ACCESS System
 - These are just a few examples of the many data feeds to ACCESS from other sources

Primary Fuel Type

- Title 33 Chapter 26 Subsection 2604 states that "annual heating fuel cost for a household unit shall be only for the cost of the primary heating fuel source of the unit."
- Most living units in Vermont have more than one heat source. The primary fuel source is the one that heats the majority of space in the living unit



Primary Fuel Type (Cont.)

- Fuel benefit amounts are based on the type of heating fuel. Benefits may only be used for the primary fuel type, and may not be shared, split, or transferred unless the applicant's primary heat source changes after a benefit has been issued.
- Example
 - Fuel benefit issued for oil, applicant moves to a home heated with propane. The fuel supplier may transfer to a propane supplier who is certified with the seasonal fuel program.

November Big Benefit Run, Daily Thereafter



- Account Numbers are not Mandatory (cannot require applicants to provide)
- Transfer of Benefits IS Mandatory (see Cert. Agreement)
- Our client/Your customer Reporting Changes

Credit Balance with a Fuel Supplier

- All benefit payments remain the property of the State of Vermont until used by the client for home heating fuel or energy
 - If a credit balance remains on the clients account after April 30th, then the balance must be returned to the Fuel Office.
 - If a fuel dealer can't make a delivery by April 30th due to road conditions, etc., then the dealer may get a delivery date extension from the Fuel Office.



Year End Refund and Consumption Report

- Consolidation of all benefits issued to your company
- Email .TXT file first week of May
- Return completed by June 15th
- Reconciliation by Fuel Office
- Data Integrity Accuracy Matters
- Refunds go back into benefits next year
