Families who left Reach Up in October 2021 through September 2022 due to time limits


Between October 2021 and September 2022 (Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2022), there were 35 instances of families leaving Reach Up due to time limits. This period was selected so that the exit dates of the families would allow us to examine their use of support programs and rate of returning to Reach Up during the 12 months following their exit from Reach Up.

During FFY 2022, some families left the Reach up program due to time limits, returned to Reach Up, and then left again due to a reason other than time limits. For families who exited Reach Up more than once, this analysis focused on the experiences related to their earliest Reach Up exit due to time limits.

All families who left Reach Up due to time limits, received 3SquaresVT benefits

In FFY 2022, all families whose Reach Up case closed due to time limits, received 3SquaresVT at least once during the subsequent 12 months. Interestingly, all families were active on 3SquaresVT in the month that their Reach Up closed.

Percentage of families who received 3SquaresVT benefits after leaving Reach Up due to time limits (Federal Fiscal Year)



Thirty-four percent of families received General Assistance during the year after leaving Reach Up

Thirty-four percent of the families used the General Assistance (GA) program during the 12 months after their forced Reach Up exit. Of the 35 families that exited RU due to time limits, 12 families received GA.


Percentage of families who left Reach Up due to time limits and received General Assistance (Federal Fiscal Year)

Of the 12 families who received General Assistance during the year after their exit from Reach Up, 100% received temporary housing. Getting help with housing has long been the most common type of GA need among the families who leave Reach Up due to time limits.


Percentage of families who left Reach Up due to time limits and received General Assistance (by type of assistance and Federal Fiscal Year)



Thirty-one percent of families who left Reach Up due to time limits, did not return within 12 months after their exit.

In FFY 2022, 35 families left Reach Up due to time limits with 69% returning to the program within 12 months after their exit. Of the 24 families who returned to the Reach Up program, 92% returned within 6 months of their exit.
