




Why the need?

- There is currently no facility within the state equipped to handle the complex treatment needs of Vermont's justiceinvolved youth
- Stress on the overall system of care
- Worse outcomes for both justice-involved youth and other youth experiencing mental health crises







Guiding Principles

DCF will oversee admission of youth, monitor outcomes, and regulate program integrity.

- Guiding Principles:
 - o Immediately available
 - \circ Evidence-based care
 - Physical and emotional safety
 - Sense of belonging
 - o Informed by stakeholders
 - Youth in need of sustained treatment





Who will be housed at the Youth Campus?




- Justice-involved youth ages 12-18
- Complex mental health needs
- Requiring clinical biopsychosocial assessment and treatment in a secure setting
- > Two distinct populations:
 - \circ $\;$ Youth at point of instability
 - Youth in need of sustained treatment





Two Programs

- 8-Bed Short-Term Stabilization
 Program
 - Immediately accessible to justice involved youth at the point of life disruption.
 - Emphasis on individual safety externally and internally, with a focus on preparing for treatment.
- 6-Bed Short-Term Treatment
 Program
 - Designed to support youth with growth and personal development. The space and services emphasize community and normalcy.





Evidence-Based Design



- Physical safety and security
- Trauma-responsive, naturecentered campus
- > Natural light
- > Art
- Sound dampening materials
- Softer finishes
- Color palette that references the natural landscape





Public Safety and Emergency Services Impact



Hardware secure campus

- Creating a program that is safe for youth and safe for staff experienced provider, high staffing ratio, de-escalation techniques
- Similar facilities:
 - River Valley Therapeutic Residence: 0 police calls
 - Middlesex Therapeutic Community Residence: 2-3 police calls per year through implementing the six core strategies for reducing seclusion and restraint
 - $\circ~$ Essex facility: occasional police calls; 0 resident harms
- Health care provided on site; rare emergency medical calls
- Ongoing communication with Public Safety



Preliminary Project Schedule


