"I realized that my love for my animals was the primary source of my joy."

"I'm always with my animals and I feel like something is wrong if they aren't with me. They are just like children. They are our babies."

"Now trying to access services for myself was the hardest part because I had to find a place to leave my animals. Once we were able to get into the emergency shelter then I was able to leave them there in a room that is comfortable...I'm feeling secured that they'll be ok and I can go and do what I need to do to necessitate getting to the next level."

"You need love in your life and I have unconditional love with Miniaga and Kyya. And through that it invigorates me. It forces me to get up the next day, to see through clearly what I need to do and focus not for myself but for them."

"They are loving it because I am happy. Once I am happy they're happy and they can just relax."

Models of Co-Sheltering: Cohabitating | Congregate



CRITICAL

- Screening
- Supplies
- Animal handling expectations
- Appropriate animal interactions for clients AND staff



Policy Considerations

- Animal health
- Cleanliness
- Animal abuse, neglect, or abandonment
- Managing animal behaviors
- Managing fears and allergies
- Spaces where animals can be within the shelter



Policy Examples

- Animal must be under control of the participant at all times.
- When in common areas, animal must be on a leash at all times.
- Cats must be carried, on leash or kept in an appropriately sized carrier/crate/covered cat stroller when outside of the participant's assigned room/pod/unit.
- Animals must be secured in an appropriately sized carrier/crate or pet housing (if available) if the participant is not in their assigned room/pod/unit.
- Animal is not permitted to enter dining areas (excludes service animals).
- Animal guardians must provide the name and contact information for an emergency care person for their animal, in the event that the animal guardian is missing or off premises for more than 24 hours.
- If the owner allows another participant to watch the animal, this decision is solely the responsibility of the owner and the animal's behavior remains the responsibility of the owner.
- At no time is staff or organization responsible for the care of the animal.
- Animal control will be contacted in the absence of the animal guardian for more than 24 hours and if the emergency care person or participant/owner is unable to be contacted or is unwilling to care for the animal.
- Humane law enforcement may be contacted if staff believe animal cruelty or neglect is taking place.




