Pardon Decision Guidelines

Consideration for a pardon is prompted to correct a grave injustice such as a miscarriage of justice or if the following criteria are met.

When the DOC receives a request to investigate a pardon application from the Office of the Governor, the investigator will use the four guideline categories outlined below to determine whether consideration for a pardon is appropriate. An investigator shall start with the objective timeframe category and if the minimum for that crime classification (e.g., felony or misdemeanor) is met, the investigator shall review the remaining subjective guideline categories (social behavior, employment, and benefit to society) in that row. If the minimum per guideline category for the applicant's crime classification cannot be met, the investigator shall consider not recommending a pardon to the Office of the Governor.
