Preserving Legacies...One Photo at a Time

The virtual "Wall of Faces", maintained by the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF), connects a face and story to each name on the wall of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. There have been calls for photos within New England, and as of this May, ten states had completely filled their portion of the wall. However, 24 out of Vermont's 100 service members who died in the Vietnam War did not have photos.

To support this call and honor those Vermonters, VSARA tweeted the names and military service records of each Vermont service member missing a photo. To date, four photos have been added, leaving only 20 more to go. We are certain that we can find a photo for each, through records in local libraries and historical societies (e.g. school yearbooks and newspapers) or through personal records of families and friends.

Water, Water Everywhere: The Vermont History Expo

The Vermont History Expo is a biennial tradition hosted by the Vermont Historical Society at the Tunbridge Fairgrounds. This summertime event consists of history exhibits and presentations, historical demonstrations, heritage animals, live historic encampments, live music, food, and more. This year's theme was the power of water. State and local heritage organizations investigated such related topics as waterpowered mills, dam building, natural rivers and lakes, snow, and even historic bathing and laundry.

One topic that received a lot of attention was flooding. This August marks the 5th anniversary of Tropical Storm Irene and the wide-scale flooding that

devastated some of Vermont's towns. And, eighty-four years before Irene, Vermont experienced a legendary flood that forever changed the state's landscape. Vermonters and their communities have been permanently altered by destructive events such as Irene and the 1927 flood.



Archival Records Showcase Vermont's Cherished State Parks

Legacy map collections from the Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation (FPR) have been described and cataloged and are open for research. The records of land and facilities management (FPR-006), covering 1920 to 2011, document years of development, recreational use, and management of state-owned land, including information about Civilian Conservation Corps projects in Vermont.

These records are interconnected with previously existing series <u>SE-008</u>, which consists of deeds, leases, contracts

and other conveyances pertaining to state property, as well as series <u>FPR-003</u>, consisting of over two centuries of land transactions related to natural resources.


Genealogical Resources Lecture—Tuesday, August 30

This open essay was published in 1934 by the Vermont Publicity Bureau, in an effort to attract part-time residents. It includes this plea:

"So here we are, we Vermonters, quite aware that the future will bring us many more summer guests than ever before, hoping very much that they will not all be tourists who flit from boarding house to hotel, but that many of them will rent or buy some of the lovely old places...and will settle down to be a valued part of our State life."

On This Day in History

This summer, historic Vermont dates take a look at poets, proprietors, and public officers!

1961 (July 5) - The famous Robert Frost, resident of and teacher in Ripton, is named the first poet-laureate for Vermont.

1781 (August 12) – Town of Barre, originally called Wildersburgh, is granted to Colonel William Williams and sixty-four other proprietors. The name was changed to Barre in 1793, and the City of Barre would be carved out of the town nearly one hundred years later.

1795 (September 23) – Alexander Twilight is born in Corinth. Among his many achievements, Twilight is known as the first African-American to serve as a state legislator. He was elected to the Vermont General Assembly in 1836.
