Director's Report

Fiscal Year 2016

Recently, during an interview with a prospective employee, I was trying to describe why I so enjoyed my work at the Office of Professional Regulation (OPR). What is it that makes me want to come to work at OPR every day? Of course I come to work to protect the public; it goes without saying. As is the case with most state government agencies, the work by the exceptional staff of dedicated public servants here at OPR *results* in public protection. But the *result* of our work is not the same as the *belief system* behind it. What we believe points us to why we do what we do and why others wish to participate in, and support, it. What appeared to inspire the applicant that sat in front of me was my statement that the belief system at the heart of OPR is all about *smart government*.

28 years ago, the Vermont Legislature gathered up and consolidated more than 30 disparate and segregated professional regulatory boards and placed them under an umbrella agency (OPR) within the Secretary of State's Office. Today, OPR oversees professional regulation by issuing 155 different license types within 50 separate professions. The legislative intent, or *belief*, behind the creation of OPR was and remains simple: unify, streamline and focus professional regulation within government operations. The Legislature did not then, and does not today, wish to see state government regulate each profession or occupation in a different manner, with a separate IT system, a separate staff, and, most importantly, a distinct business process. Unification through OPR is a smart approach not just for the operation of state government, but for the marketplace it regulates that is not served by confronting a confusing state regulatory environment.

As expected, over time, the consolidation of professional licensing at OPR has led to significant efficiencies in the business process of professional regulation in Vermont and to a smarter government solution. The complex business process necessary to drive each of the essential components of professional regulation, from licensing, to inspection, to enforcement, has been, and continues to be, harmonized whenever possible across all 50 professions so that, for the most part, OPR does things one way, the most efficient way, not 50 different ways, to the benefit of our licensees and the general public. In other words, through a licensing umbrella agency model, Vermont has eliminated enormous amounts of excess red tape that no longer stifles the marketplace and the professionals that operate within it. This is important for today's OPR and for the future as OPR continues to onboard additional professions each year through legislative decisions to either regulate a new profession or move an existing regulated profession to OPR from another branch of state government.

Why we do what we do at OPR is because it is smart government. Smart government is our mission and forms the basis of our collective belief system. How do we achieve our mission at OPR? We unify the professions through consolidation, manage and streamline each profession's business process utilizing best practices, and continuously focus our attention as a state agency on what we do best: the business of professional regulation. OPR is proud to provide public protection for Vermonters through efficient licensing of professionals and smart government.




Figure 1: Trend in total annual licensure.

Each professional license is issued in accordance with a pre-existing odd or even year renewal cycle. Nursing, which comprises approximately 38% of the total licensure population, is OPR's largest profession. Consequently, OPR's total annual licensure data is heavily influenced by the Nursing renewal cycle. Specifically, this impact manifests as a growth in OPR's licensee population during even years, and a slight decrease during odd years.

However, in 2015 a new policy prevented 2,785 international registered nurses (IRN) from renewing their professional licenses. This resulted in an irregularly steep nursing population decline. Hypothetical trend line "Corrected for IRN" illustrates the total licensure which may have occurred, had the IRN instead remained active.

As a result of the loss of IRN, the total licensure population is about 3% lower than it would otherwise be at the end of 2016. Nevertheless, the total licensure is expected to continue to grow at an average rate of 2.5% per annum. Moreover, with the addition of new professions at OPR, such as alcohol and drug abuse counselors and foresters, the rate of growth of the total number of licensees, is likely to increase.

Average Annual Initial License Application Duration Data: 2010-2016




Figure 2: Trend in mean initial license application duration, across all professions.

The average initial license application processing time continues to decrease each year. The average increase in efficiency is equal to roughly -7.36 processing days per year. However, the above graph **does not** represent OPR's operational efficiency, but rather that of the entire process. These measurements and any increase in efficiency therein, are highly dependent on external factors. For example, applications by endorsement require other state agencies and licensing boards to provide OPR with the requisite information. Similarly, applications by examination require the applicant to sit for an exam. The same can be said for applications requiring board-approval, which remain pending until the following board meeting.

In fact, nearly all professions allow for application in multiple ways (i.e. registration, endorsement, and examination). While applications by registration are very quick (often same-day turnover), applications by endorsement or exam can require considerably longer durations. As such, the above graph and all measurements regarding the average initial license application processing duration, reflect the average time needed to receive a license across all pathways, rather than OPR's individual performance.

OPR's most significant software limitation is the inability to track application processing durations independent from the responsibilities of external actors. Future software considerations will better capture OPR's performance within the larger process of license administration. It is important to acknowledge that the majority of applications are not complete upon submission to OPR. As such, it is assumed that only those applications which are processed same-day, were submitted to OPR in a complete fashion.

Initial Licensure Application Data: 2013-2016




Figure 3: Trend in frequency of initial licensure applications.

In 2016, there were nearly 7,000 new applications for professional licensure, of which 2,741 were processed same-day and 3,955 were processed in 5 business days or less. On average, the number of new license applications continues to grow at a rate of roughly 252 new applications per year.




Figure 4: Proportional trends in initial licensure processing duration.

Notably, the proportion of applications processed same-day is also growing, at an average rate of roughly 1.2% per annum. Likewise, the proportion of license applications processed in 5 business days or less, is increasing at an average rate of roughly 3.4% per annum. It is both possible and likely that OPR is processing all applications same-day, if said applications are considered complete at the time of submission. The growth in 5-day processing times, is likely a result of increases in efficiencies with external agencies/boards.

Additionally, it is worth noting that all license renewals are performed online, and are considered same-day. In this way, the initial application for licensure is the longest process any licensee will experience, unless disciplinary review is required.

Complaint Resolution Data: 2011-2016




Figure 5: Total new complaint cases per annum.

In 2016, OPR received 540 new complaints. Since 2014, there is a small annual growth in the proportion of cases closed after screening or investigation. It is hypothesized that an emphasis on enhanced screening and investigative procedures will reduce the proportion of cases dismissed by the hearing authority or by the prosecutor, as well as an increase in the proportion of cases resulting in discipline by stipulation and consent, or by contested hearing.

However, at the time of this report's writing, there are still a large number of pending cases: 2016, 386; 2015, 61; 2014, 26; 2013, 6; 2012, 1. The data limitations as a result of the high number of pending cases, prevents statistical inference about the effects of new enforcement processes.




Figure 6: Proportional Trends in Annual Complaint Case Resolution.

Complaint Processing Duration Data: 2011-2016






Figure 7: Trends in average complaint case duration (days) by resolution outcome.


Between 2011 and 2016, the average time required for a complaint case to be screened out (closed) or closed after investigation has decreased at an average annual rate of -9.8 days and -25.8, respectively. Between 2011 and 2015, the average time required for a complaint to be dismissed by the prosecutor or by the hearing authority has decreased by an average annual rate of -25.4 days and -3.7 days, respectively. The same is true for discipline by default, by stipulation (stip.) and consent, and by contested hearing: -0.4 days, -8.7 days, and -35.7 days, respectively. On average, OPR has successfully decreased the enforcement duration in all case resolutions.


As stated previously, there are still a large number of pending cases. As a result, all data from 2014 forward, is subject to at least minor change. Similarly, data for 2016 is considered accurate only in the "screened out" and "closed after investigation" resolutions. Additional data from 2016 will be available in the 2017 annual report.

Board of Public Accountancy











Over the past 5 years, the Public Accountancy profession grew by an average rate of 30 licensees per annum. Public Accountancy comprises a small proportion of the total licensure (2016: 2.7%) and, historically, is responsible for about 1.5% of the total discipline. Public accountancy's application process begins with the scheduling of 4 exams (18 months to complete), then a 4-year allowance to finalize additional licensure requirements. In addition to the aforementioned details, these applications also require the board's approval (i.e. a board meeting). As such, there are no expectations of same-day or same-week application processing.

Acupuncturists




Over the past five years, the Acupuncture profession grew at an average rate of 9 licensees per annum. This profession makes up a very small proportion of the total licensure (2016: 0.3%) and historically makes up 0% of the total discipline.

Board of Allied Mental Health Practitioners




Over the past five years, the Allied Mental Health professions grew by an average rate of 100 licensees per annum. These professions make up a small proportion of the total licensure (2016: 3.5%), and historically are responsible for about 3% of the total discipline.

Applied Behavior Analysts



In fiscal year 2016 there were 75 Applied Behavior Analysts licensed at OPR. This is the profession's first year under OPR regulation. Nearly all license applications were processed same-day or in 5-days or less.

Board of Architects



Over the past five years, the Architect profession grew by an average rate of about 26 licensees per annum. This profession involves a pre-determined license application process allowing up to 5 years for completion, and sameday or same-week license processing is not expected. This profession makes up a small proportion of the total licensure (2016: 2.1%), and historically is responsible for 1.2% of the total discipline.

Boxing





Board of Dental Examiners





Hearing Aid Dispensers









Midwifery













Over the past five years, the Nursing Professions lost an average of 1,232 licensees per annum. In 2015 a new policy prevented 2,785 international registered nurses (IRN) from renewing their licenses. As such, the licensure rate for nursing appears to be in a steep decline. However, if the IRN remained active, the nursing licensure decline would be far less dramatic. The nursing professions make up a large proportion of the total licensure (2016: 38.3%), and historically are responsible for about 64.8% of the total discipline.



Occupational Therapists





Opticians






Property Inspectors

Respiratory Care Practitioners





Speech-Language Pathologists




The Speech-Language Pathologist profession is a new addition to OPR. In 2016 this profession made up less than 1% of the total licensure.
